In a short, impressive well attended ceremony Tuesday evening, March 24 at 8:00 p.m., the Village of Riverview and the Township of Monguagon became history and the City of Riverview was born.

Charter Commission Chairman, Robert Galloway, administered the oath of office to the first Mayor of the City of Riverview, Thomas McShane, and to Riverview's first City Councilmembers who are: Leotha Perry, Jim Jones, Al Brackett, Ray Vollmar, William Homeister, and Clayton Smith, and Gilbert Zitzelsberger the City's first Justice of the Peace.

Prior to the inauguration ceremonies, Don H. Smith, who acted as Master of Ceremonies for the evening, introduced the Charter Commission, the Township officials and the Village officials.

Dignitaries from neighboring communities were also introduced. Among them were: Mrs. John Lesinski, wife of Congressman Lesinski; Mrs. William Copeland, wife of Wyandotte councilman Copeland, Councilman Groat, also of Wyandotte, Wyandotte's City Clerk, Ford Wagner and City Treasurer and Assessor, Ira Kreyger and Ernie Shultz.

Mayor Anderson of Southgate was on hand as was Flat Rock's Assessor, Charles Hammond.

Many other political and industrial leaders were also introduced.

Rev. Eugene Fedewa of St. Cyprians Church gave the Invocation and Rev. Roland Liesman of the Riverview Methodist Church offered the Benediction.

### Council Turns Down Plat

At their final meeting the Village Council, on the advice of the Planning Commission, denied approval to the plat presented to them by Holtzman and Silverman for the construction of 23 houses.

The homes are to be built at the corner of Longsdorf and Quarry Roads.

The reason given for the disapproval was that the proposed size for the lots was smaller than the recently adopted Zoning Ordinance requires. (The lot size proposed by the builders is 50 feet and the Ordinance calls for 60 foot lots.)

Holtzman and Silverman have asked that the Council reconsider the plat because they say the 50 foot lot is in keeping with the size of the rest of the lots in the immediate area.

The matter was again referred to the Planning Commission.

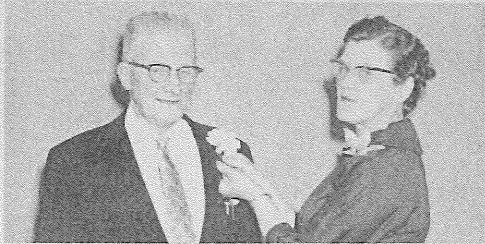

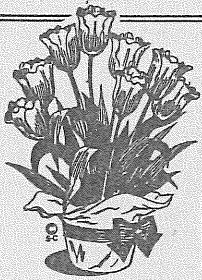
The Riverview office of the Peoples Bank has helped many hundreds of residents finance automobiles, homes, heating conversion units, garages, fencing, and appliances. Check-

 Lighting the countryside in its beautiful flight.

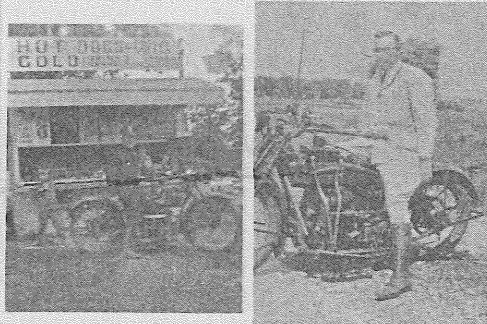

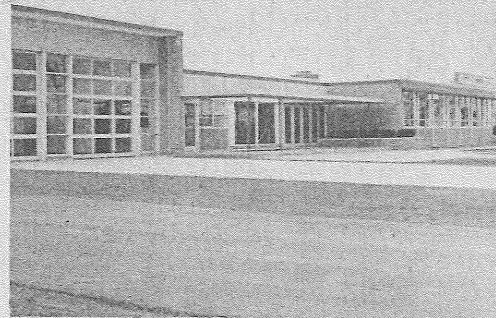

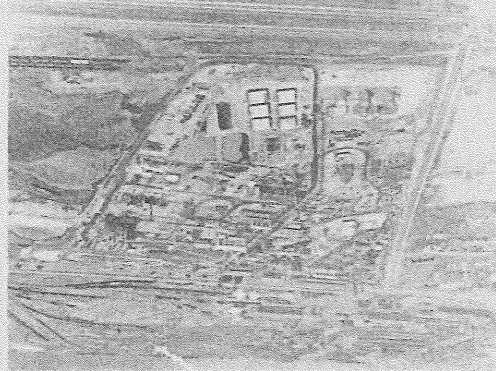
